Third Grade Student of Hawaii Receives Highest Award in the 30th Annual MOA Museum of Art International Children's Art Contest.

Lila Yamashiro, daughter of Steve and Amy Yamashiro of Honolulu, won the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Award, the highest award possible for an entry outside of Japan. The 30th Annual MOA Museum of Art Children's Art Exhibition is Japan's most renowned children's art contest, even supported by and participated by Japan's Prime Minister and his cabinet. This year's entries totaled 456,646 from throughout Japan and 17,215 foreign entries from 13 countries outside of Japan. From these foreign entries, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs chooses only one painting. Hawaii has participated in this contest since it began in 1989, 30 years ago, yet this top award has always eluded us. This year, for the first time in 30 years, an American has finally won. An American from Hawaii, Lila Yamashiro, has won the highest award possible presented for a foreign entry. After hearing the great news, her parents did not hesitate to decide to go to Japan for the Awards Ceremony held on January 27 at the MOA Museum of Art in Atami



City, Shizuoka Prefecture. The MOA Museum of Art Children's Art Exhibition is open to elementary school children, grades 1-6. A little over 40% of all of Japan's elementary schools annually participate in this contest. lt is supported by The Office of the Prime Minister of Japan; Ministry of Education, Sports, Culture. Science and Technology of

Japan; Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan; National Congress of PTA of Japan; National Federation of Kodomo-Kai (Children's League); and the Scout Association of Japan. Representatives of the above supporters are added to the panel of 16 judges who jury the hundreds of paintings sent in that represent exhibitions conducted throughout the world.

300 artworks consisting of paintings or calligraphy are chosen and awarded gold, silver, bronze or honorable mention for each grade level, all honored to be displayed. The whole exhibition will last throughout the month of February. Part of the exhibit, including Lila's painting, will then go on tour throughout Japan and the world. In May, it will be a part of the Hawaii State and International Children's Painting Exhibition, tentatively scheduled to be at the Hawaii State Capital Building. This exhibition will feature 36 paintings of this show, 28 paintings from each of Hawaii's 6 district exhibitions, 19 award-winning paintings from MOA Nagaoka's exhibition, and paintings from Central and South America.

<u>Lila's Comments</u>: "*Sleepy Cat* is a picture that I painted with Oil Pastels. After making the picture, I covered the blue carpet purple and made the green outside of the carpet black. I then scratched in the lines. Starting with the orange striped cat, surrounding it with the blue and purple carpet makes the cat really stand out. Then the eyes of the cat are green, same as the background. This makes the eyes very powerful and makes the cat look dazed, looks like a sleepy cat. I enjoyed making this picture and was very happy that it won but surprised."

<u>Judges' Comments</u>: "With vibrant colors against a simple dark green background, the appearance of the cat lying so relaxed is drawn impressively. Bold lines such as the contour or striped pattern of the cat contrast with the scratched lines so well in the carpet and the background, giving a change to the painting making the finished work an even more attractive piece of artwork."

Lila's Once in a Lifetime Trip

The Yamashiro family had an amazing trip to Japan, thanks to MOA. We had always wanted to visit Japan, and the perfect opportunity presented itself when Lila was awarded the "Ministry of Foreign Affairs Award" at the Children's Art Exhibit at the MOA Museum of Art in Atami, Japan.

We flew into Narita and spent two full days in Tokyo. We bundled up and headed into the 30-something degree mornings to explore the beautiful city. We visited many special places, marveling at how safe and clean it was everywhere we went. At the Tokyo Sky-Tree, we got a panoramic view of the city from 350 meters (1148 feet) up, while at the Tokyo-Edo Museum we had a glimpse into Tokyo's long and fascinating history. Thanks to MOA Hawaii's Steve Ichikawa, we got tickets in advance to the Digital Art Museum in Odaiba to experience the spectacular light shows and to see our kids' drawings came to life. We squeezed in a visit to a city playground, where fun was the universal language. We loved getting around the city by walking, riding the train, and taking an occasional taxi. One highlight of our time in Tokyo was meeting four sumo wrestlers at a taxi stand and watching them pile into a sub-compact taxi.

We said a fond farewell to Tokyo and boarded the Bullet train bound for Atami. Roy met us at the station with Yuko, a staff member from the MOA International office. After dropping off our luggage, we had the most amazing lunch and tour of the MOA museum with Roy and Yuko. As we ascended the seven flights of underground escalators, we made the mental transition from hustle-bustle to serenity and beauty. The center Rotunda held the Children's Art exhibit. We visited Lila's "Sleepy Cat" and took in the beautiful and creative artwork of children from all over the world.

The museum was a marvel, with overwhelming beauty everywhere we looked. We tried to convey to the kids how special it was to see such important cultural treasures, some dating back to the 7th century. We made our way to the Noh

Theater, where Roy and Torii gave Lila a rehearsal of what to expect during the awards ceremony, which was incredibly reassuring for her. As we were wrapping up our tour in the gallery featuring the most exquisite lacquer ware of Kazumi Murose, a Living National Treasure of Japan, we met the artist himself. Mr. Murose was with the Museum Director Dr. Tokugo Uchida. Despite their high stature, they made Lila feel like the VIP of the group, buying her an ice cream at the Cafe and showering her with congratulations.

The next day was the ceremony, and we had amazing

seats right up front. Roy translated the ceremony for us, which we could hear through small headsets. We felt like we were part of the United Nations! This allowed us to learn about the
